Notification

Cancellation



Salisbury & Stonehenge 9:30am, Tuesday 14 April

Will it be the Cathedral with its tallest spire in the country, and perhaps a chance to see one of the 4 Magna Carta's in this 800th year of our 'constitution' and the new interactive exhibition that opens in the Cathedral on 7th March . Mompesson House (NT) in the Cathedral Close, or Salisbury Museum may appeal.

Alternatively, there are always the shops, the Market that is always in town on Tuesday's, or maybe a walk along the River Nadder in Elizabeth gardens,

After your free time – don't forget to have lunch – we head off to Stonehenge, and its wonderful new visitors centre. With plenty of time allowed to both browse through the exhibition, and to take the shuttle down to the stones, all we need to wish for is fine weather. If you have a Smartphone, either iPhone or Andoid, why not download the Stonehenge Audio guide from the Play Store or iTunes to listen to while you are there.

Don't forget to bring your National Trust or English Heritage membership cards. Money saved on entry could well support another outing.

Stourhead 9:30am, 5th May

A Wiltshire gem, Stourhead was one of the first houses built in the Palladian style back in the early 18th century. Now



cared for by the National Trust, the house was built by Henry Hoare, a wealthy banker (*Ed: Is there any other sort*), who filled this showcase with magnificent paintings and furniture by Thomas Chippendale; much of these works of art can still be seen today. Make sure you don't miss the Pope's Cabinet, one of Henry Hoare's prized possessions.

However, in spring time, many just visit Stourhead to enjoy its spectacular gardens. During spring the gardens are at their height of glory. Just stopping, or sitting, to enjoy the scenery is worth the visit on its own. You may also wish to take the garden tour. Originally laid

out in the 18th century for Henry Hoare to take his guests around to see all the sites, this tour will take you about 90 minutes, over a distance of about 2 miles of easy walking. Who knows, you may even see the ghost; I was lucky enough to see him when I was there some years ago!

The is a National Trust property. If you are a member of NT, please bring your membership cards with you. Booking for this outing closes on 1st April.

Slimbridge 8:00am, 28th May



A trip to let you savour the countryside, wetlands, and wildlife. Located near Stroud, this World Wildlife Trust site covers an area of over 800 acres on the edge of the River Severn. While a haven for bird spotters and photographers, there is something for everyone. In addition to the walks though the wetlands bird spotting as you go, there are hides to get fabulous views of the birds (and rest one's feet), loads of amphibians to see, talks, and organised walks. For garden lovers, there is even a show garden from Chelsea that has been transported to Slimbridge to give it a permanent home. Artists can enjoy the work of Sir Peter Scott and others in the Art Gallery; wildlife art is an important part of Slimbridge WWT.

To make the most of your visit, why not download a map from the Slimbridge website before you go so that you can plan your day. The Slimbridge website also has details of activities and events.

The Importance of Being Earnest Mayflower Theatre Wednesday, 3 June

Swanage and Steam Railway 9:30am, 16th June



Steam and Sea, what could be better. This outing takes you on the Swanage Steam Railway from Norden to Swanage, followed by free time in Swanage, before returning by train to Norden. Leaving Norden our steam-hauled train travels along the 6 mile line, passing the beautiful ruins of Corfe Castle. This journey, which takes half an hour,



passes through some of the most scenic countryside in the Purbecks. Overall, a delight for photographers and steam enthusiasts alike, while providing other not so afflicted views of the unspoilt Dorset countryside.

After arriving in Swanage, there is plenty of free time to explore this traditional seaside town. Many will no doubt sit on deckchair on the sandy beach watching the world go by, or take a walk out along the Victorian pier. Whatever your taste, this is a typical summer seaside trip with a difference.

Henley Royal Regatta 9:30am, 2nd July

If you are part of, or wish to be part of, the Social Scene there are a few places one must be seen. Royal Ascot is one such place, another is Henley for the regatta. Founded in 1839, Henley Regatta – as it was originally known prior to royal patronage – pre-dates any national or international rowing organisation and has its own set of rules and regulations. Today though, it is recognised by British Rowing (our national body) and FISA (Fédération Internationale des Sociétés d'Aviron), the international body.



Our outing to this famous event is on Thursday, the 2nd day of the 5 day spectacular. Rowers from across the world will compete in the heats being held; in 2014 there were around 80 races to watch.

Aside from the rowing, you will also get the opportunity to enjoy the whole carnival atmosphere, with several hours to do just what pleases you. And you don't even have to worry about driving and all the queues associated with festival events.



Following time to look around the house and water mill, we will join a boat cruise on the Thames, returning to Mapledurham to catch our coaches home

RHS Wisley

9:30am, 8th September

RHS Wisley dates back over 100 years to 1903 when the Wisley site was given to the RHS by Sir Thomas Hanbury, a wealthy Quaker. Since that time Wisley has grown considerably.

Each year, Wisley hosts its famous flower show, and our visit is planned for the first day of the show when all the exhibits will be at their best. Personally, not being a gardener but one that appreciates the beauty and tranquillity our flora can offer, this kind of show is a must to visit. With camera in hand, I shall be looking in amazement at the glory of all the variations of dahlia that will be on display. No doubt others will have their



own favourites. Mind you, I'm glad that I am not a keen gardener for I feel I would be disappointed by my miserable efforts when compared to those of the professionals.

Not too good on the ole pins. We understand that it is possible to borrow wheel chairs, including electric wheelchairs, for a £5 deposit. Please indicate if this would be of use on the booking form and will do our best to reserve one for you, no guarantees though.

London Tour (Dickens & Foundling Museum) 8:00am, 16th & 23rd September

An early start for this double headed tour, the ever popular London walking tour as one half and a visit to a place of interest for the other.

The walking tour will, as usual, be led by one of our well known Blue-badge guides. This year the theme is Dickens London. Born local to many of us in Portsmouth, Dickens did spend most of his life in London. Our guided tour, which will last between 1 ½ to 2 hours will take us through the areas that featured in many of his novels.

The Foundling Hospital (hospital used in its more general sense of hospitality to those less fortunate) was founded as a children's home for the education and maintenance of exposed and deserted young children and accepted its first children in 1741. It operated until the 1950's when there was a change away from institutions to fostering and adoption for children needing care. The Foundling Hospital changed its name to Thomas Coram Foundation for Children, a charity for children in London that operates as the Coram charity.

The Foundling Museum, which is housed in some of the old hospital buildings, and houses the art collection amassed by the Foundling Hospital, and the Gerald Coke Handel Collection, focussing on the life and work of the composer Handel.

Due to numbers that can be accommodated on the walks, this trip will be run on two separate days. Please indicate which day you would like to attend; if possible choose the 'either day' option to allow the committee the flexibility of balancing numbers and accommodating as many people as possible of the trips

Wells

9:30am, 7th October

Another beautiful city, the medieval city of Wells has only 12000 inhabitants, but boasts a magnificent cathedral and many other wonderful buildings, including the moated Bishop's Palace, Vicars Close, and a museum.

In addition to the major historic buildings, there are the narrow streets to cruise through while admiring the eclectic mix of building styles reflecting on the development of the town through the ages.

Our trip is on a Wednesday, a day of the week that there is also a Farmers Market in Wells, adding extra interest.



To get the most out of your visit why not take a guided tour. There is a public guided walk in the morning which you can join by paying the guide along with other members of the public, and in the afternoon we have arranged for a guided walk for our members. Both the walks are optional.

London (Free time) 9:30am, 17th November

When was the last time you saw the Christmas lights in London, or marvelled at the Christmas display windows in Harrods or Selfridges. Your opportunity to kick-off the Christmas spirit with a spot of retail therapy, and, as the light fades, marvel at the spectacular decorations that are so special to London.

Last year, in Oxford Street alone there were almost 1800 Christmas decorations, and ¾ million LED bulbs!

The trip is timed to allow shopping and by leaving at 6:00pm, sufficient time to see the lights in full darkness; provided that we don't encounter too much traffic getting out of London we



should be back at Hursley before 8:00pm. The 6:00pm departure also gives those that wish the opportunity of taking in an afternoon matinee, but make sure you don't miss the coach - we won't wait.

Hursley Museum Services - Spring 2015 update

Help Please!

We've had a busy time since the last newsletter, and would like to start with a request for information. Please send any info to Peter.

- 1. We have found what looks like an engineering mock-up of a disk drive labelled Lilliput. This name has not come up before, we suspect it may be a forerunner of Piccolo. Can anyone throw any light on this please?
- 2. In conversation with a retiree recently, we were told that many moons ago IBM had an underground storage facility in the Cotswolds. Or was it Dorset? He remembers helping to wheel in obsolete items of hardware, but not where it was. Can anyone provide any more information about this? We are naturally curious as to whether this facility still exists or if it may lie forgotten and full of interesting artefacts! The name 'Blue Mountain' was also mentioned.

3D Panoramas

There is now a set of 3D panoramas of all but one display room of the museum. These can be viewed on the web site at http://hursley.slx-online.biz/views.asp.

Current Activities & Acquisitions

There have seen a number of interesting acquisitions for the museum since the last newsletter. The 'big one' is the long-awaited Royal Army Pay Corps IBM 705 console, together with one IBM 727 tape unit, an 024 card punch, 056 card verifier and a 3350 disk drive, the latter from their S/370 model 158. These are on long-term loan from the Adjutant General Corps at Worthy Down.






Sadly we are missing many bits, such as the table tops and card weights for the punch and verifier. The innards of the tape unit were removed at some point and we have an interesting pile of bits and an empty case - mega Meccano! We had an interesting time getting the 3350 indoors, requiring us to remove all the door brackets to just squeeze through the doors, and the Head Disk Assemblies (HDAs) to get the weight down. The 024 card punch has been brought back to life. It was in some places rusty and in many places gummed up solid, but a couple of days' work during November has seen it punching cards again. It and its companion 056 card verifier have received home-made replacement table tops from laminated chipboard - wrong colour but they keep the keyboards off the floor! The 056 has been brought mechanically to the point where we could power up, but unfortunately one of the duo relays is physically damaged - missing armature. We have also received the 082 sorter from Buchan House, Edinburgh, via a prolonged stay at Greenock. Our friends in Lyngby, Denmark, have sent us an IBM 091 Hollerith Type III Tabulator from 1921, together with a couple of typewriters.





There have been a few small donations including a PC, a PC-XT, a PS/2 Model 30 with a dot matrix printer, a Proprinter I and a BBC Micro. The PC emitted lots of smoke and now smells bad, the XT is just dead, so static exhibit potential only (once the smell goes!). The Proprinter works well, we can't test the BBC as we don't have an old TV. We have also received an American dial telephone from Eric Bodger, a UK dial phone and a Hursley Tea Trolley Bell from John Chapman.

Other News

In the last newsletter we reported on a warehouse find in the US consisting of a large number of S/360, S/370 and peripherals. Since then the people charged with disposing of this stash have stopped communicating, so we don't know what is happening. We have found reference in a US forum that the collection is being handled by a waste recycling company that has realised they have potentially a higher value as collectors' items. Their last update was last April, where they said they'd 'soon' be contacting collectors, but that has yet to happen. We have appended the forum to make sure they know about us.

Around the time of the last newsletter, the museum loaned a number of artefacts to Barclays Bank for their 50th mainframe celebrations. We also arranged for a number of artefacts to be shipped to an FTT event at Heathrow in September. This Think Foundation event is attended by all IBM graduates and apprentices in the UK. We have now loaned a number of artefacts to the Bristol office, where the Cloudant development group will be housed.

Following the huge success of last year's Computer Conservation Society meeting at Hursley, we hosted a further 42 members of the group on the 26th September. They heard a talk on the site history, an in depth appreciation of some of the museum artefacts and a third talk on the history of CICS. The highlight for attendees was once again the visit to the museum. One of the CCS meeting attendees has borrowed a couple of video reel tapes to see if he can find a facility to view and transfer the collection we have in the museum.

Three of our AS/400s are now working, together with an iSeries, a fourth has an intermittent disk error. Work continues on a fourth one and we now have a copy of CICS/400 for demonstration, installation planned imminently.

YouTube

We now have the capability of transferring video tapes directly to PC from a combination of different VCR formats. Our YouTube collection is growing! There's a Hursley Park collection at https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCX00VSqR9UI9pvayqc5loqA

Site Model

The model of the Hursley site has been moved from the conservatory at the side of the House into the museum, and can now be viewed in HLG19.

York Museum

We have made contact with a <u>computer museum near York</u> and have agreed to donate most of our non-IBM artefacts to them, together with a few IBM machines where we have a number of examples.

Engineering Anniversary

This year marks the anniversary of the arrival of Vickers Supermarine at Hursley in late 1940 and with it a 75 year period of innovation and excellence in engineering on the site which stretches from Supermarine's Spitfire and post War Jet fighters through to the System/360, the Cashpoint, CICS, and beyond..

There are plans to mark this anniversary but to do so we need your help. What do you think were the landmark innovations that Hursley pioneered or developed? Were you involved in any of them? If you were, would you be prepared to share your memories on both the projects themselves, and what it was like to work here at the time?



Choir - 'Sing Winchester'


